

Obituary

Coleman James "Jimmy" Lowe made his transition to a better place, earlier this month, in Detroit, Michigan. Jimmy was born, the second of three children, to Reverend Coleman and Mrs. Lillie Lowe.

Jimmy received his early education by attending Scale Street Elementary School, and then to Easom High, where he was involved in many school activities such as: band, football, basketball, Hi-Y, student council, Explorers Club, Industrial Arts Club, French Club, Dramatics Club, Boy Scout Troop #53, 1965 Editor of the Easom High Yearbook, paper staff, Science Club, and Business Club. At Easom, Jimmy played two seasons as an end before being shifted to quarterback in his junior and senior years. He also excelled in baseball and basketball for the Yellow Jackets, and was a member of the 1964-65 Easom championship basketball squad. After graduating from Easom High in 1965, Jimmy attended Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama, where he pledged to what he considered to be the best fraternity in the world, Kappa Alpha Psi. He became a four-year letterman, and was selected to the All-SIAC team three consecutive seasons. He was described as "one of the best in the league" by his college coach. Jimmy led the SIAC in pass receptions with 65 in his ten games. Not only was he one of the top athletes at Tuskegee, but he rated among the top in his school work majoring in mechanical industries. He was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in 1969, and later played for the Hartford Knights. Football was among one of his passions. He was also a very talented musician mastering the trumpet, guitar, and keyboard. Any time and any place there was music, you could easily get a solo from him.

After his career with the NFL, Jimmy fulfilled his second passion as a teacher in the Detroit City School District, teaching at Hampton Middle School, Halley Middle school and coached football at Central, Henry Ford, and Martin Luther King High Schools, inspiring children in the classroom and on the football field for over 30 years He was active in the Detroit community. He volunteered his time as a mentor and coach for many city football leagues. In his neighborhood, he was known to freely mow lawns, shovel snow, and assist his neighbors in any way he could. He enjoyed cooking, playing music, and entertaining friends, especially his family. When Jimmy would come home for the holidays or special events, you would be assured of musical renditions, poetry, and "Standup Comic Acts!" Within this humor, Jimmy possessed a "Big" heart, and a genuine "Love" for his family.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Reverend Coleman and Mrs. Lilli M. Lowe, grandparents Sam and Mattie L. McGhee, Coleman and Miranda Gaines-Lowe, two brother-in –laws, James W. Settle and William S. Warren, and a nephew PFC Kolben Patton.

Surviving this great loss are two loving sisters, Jean Lowe-Settle, Holly Springs, MS and Albertine Lowe-Warren of Bethel Springs, TN, nephews, Kerry Patton (Cassie), Birmingham, AL, Konson R. CORINTH, Miss. -- A former Easom High football star be-came the second Corinthian to join the pro football ranks in

join the pro football ranks in the past two years. James Lowe, a 1965 graduate of Easom, was drafted by the Cleveland Browns of the National football League last week in the combined AFL-NFL draft of college players. Last year James Wren, another graduate of Easom High, signed as a free agent with the Detroit Lions of the NFL after graduating from Jackson State Teachers College in Jackson, Miss.

Lowe is completing his senior year at Tuskegee Institute in Tuskegee, Ala., at the present time and will join the Browns when practice gets underway this fall.






